100 million donors across the nation



Donate Life America (DLA) has announced that a key goal set by the donor/ transplant community in 2006 was achieved in October 2011. The United

States can now boast that 100 million Americans — roughly 42 percent of the adult population — are registered as organ, eye and tissue donors in state donor registries.

"I am proud to witness meeting such a milestone in organ/tissue donor history," said Secretary of State Jesse White. "Our ultimate goal is to see that all Americans become registered donors."

More than 112,000 people are currently awaiting lifesaving organ transplants. Thousands more await tissue transplants to resume their normal lives. Last year, more than 28,000 people received organ transplants, more than 40,000 received corneal transplants and hundreds of thousands received tissue transplants, yet 6,590 died awaiting organ transplants. A surge in the number of donors is necessary to save more lives. Therefore, work has already begun to reach the new national goal of registering 20 million new donors by the end of 2012.

"At a time when we as a nation have difficulty finding common ground on many important issues, 100 million people have agreed on their desire to save lives by registering as donors. For that, we say thank you," said David Fleming, president and CEO of Donate Life America. "While this achievement speaks volumes about the generosity of human beings, more work needs to be done to motivate Americans to register and save the lives of those in need."

In 2006, DLA launched the Donor Designation Collaborative (DDC) as a nationwide effort to improve donor rates. A main tactic for achieving the DDC's goals is ensuring that each state has an effective system for registering donors. Since the DDC's launch, there has been a 45 percent increase in the number of designated donors in the United States.

Facilities in Elgin, Libertyville, Woodstock and Schaumburg all hosted a representative, and in some cases a recipient, who provided donor information to customers.

Donor counter mats



The Organ/Tissue Donor Program presented donor counter mats to Driver Services facilities statewide in its newest effort to promote donor aware-

ness to facility customers. The mats feature an image of a driver's license highlighting how to indicate if someone is a registered donor. This campaign is mirrored after the success of the Chicago Grant Project during September and October 2011.

Each facility received a display based on their primary demographic, either Caucasian, African-American or Hispanic. The counter mats focus on catching the attention of each customer as they approach the counter for a transaction.

On average, nearly 8 million people join a state donor registry each year, with roughly 97 percent joining through state DMVs. Therefore, DLA builds strong relationships with many DMV officials to encourage education and training of their staffs to help them better advocate for donation.

As of June 30, 2011, data reported by DLA state teams revealed that 42 percent of U.S. adults (age 18 and older) are registered as donors. States with the highest percentage included Alaska and Montana (78% each) and Washington (74%).

National KidneyMobile reaches milestone

Since 2005, the National Kidney Foundation of Illinois' KidneyMobile has traveled statewide, educating the public on the importance of kidney disease and screening individuals for risk factors, specifically high blood pressure and diabetes. The KidneyMobile partners with numerous health education and community awareness organizations, including health centers, hospitals, health departments and community groups to bring this important health message to Illinoisans.

"Most of those at risk have no idea they are at risk for developing kidney disease," said nurse practitioner Nancy Lepain, who travels with the KidneyMobile. "The two main causes of chronic kidney disease are uncontrolled diabetes and poorly controlled blood pressure."

The KidneyMobile has reached more than 26,000 individuals, a milestone for the organization's fight for the early detection of kidney disease. Screenings are free to the public. According to the Kidney Foundation, 74 percent of those screened tested abnormal in one or more result, and 29 percent needed an immediate referral for follow-up tests and/or care.

Melody Warden

Melody Warden has been with the Secretary of State's office since November 2000. She currently works as a public service representative at Springfield's Dirksen facility. Melody is the mother of two chil-

dren, Christian, age 13, and William, who would have turned 26 this year.

In April 1999, Melody received a driver's license renewal notice in the mail, which included the Secretary of State's donor brochure. Her son, William, inquired about donation and as she explained he responded, "Mom, if anything ever happens to me... this is what I want to do. I won't need my organs and I might as well help someone else live."

A month later on May 6, 1999, William was in an accident and passed away a week later on May 14. After just discussing organ donation with her son, there was no hesitation for William to become a donor. William donated his heart, liver and kidneys.

Since William's passing, Melody has been active in attending several donor memorials at the Prairie State Wildlife Park in Peoria as well as tree-planting memorials. She also has had the extraordinary opportunity to meet her son's heart recipient, Barbara, in Wisconsin and has corresponded with his liver recipient, Connie, as well.

"Through his wishes to donate, it helps my healing," said Warden. "Being a donor mom has given me strength knowing that William does live on."


